


Through The Years

1926 - 1937

- University of Wisconsin began planning courses in physical therapy, becoming one of the oldest programs in the country. Courses were offered to students seeking a BS or MS degree in physical education as electives. Supervised clinical experiences were required at Wisconsin General Hospital.
- Courses were housed in the Department of Physical Education with Dr Helen Denniston as Director.
- The program became accredited by APTA in 1929 as one of only three PT curricula in the US (non-degree program)
- A certificate of Physical Therapy was awarded in 1937 and UW was included on initial list of accredited PT programs.
- 4-year BS degree in Physical Medicine was later established.

- On January 25, 1929, the first meeting of the Wisconsin Chapter of the APTA took place during a severe blizzard. The meeting took place in room 725 of the Loraine Hotel and was attended by Laura Borwell, Madison; Mildren Elson, Milwaukee; Claire B. Miller, La Crosse; and Florence Phenix, Milwaukee.
- The Constitution and Bylaws were accepted. Elected officers were: President Mildred Elson, Vice-President Laura Borwell, Secretary Florence Phenix, Treasurer Muriel Patrick (Kenosha) and Claire Miller as memberat-large.

- First Wisconsin Chapter newsletter, known as "Home Town Thistle Down News" was published with Lucy Blair as its founding Editor.
- Publication later became known as Wisconsin Chapter News and eventually PT Connections.

• First APTA National Conference (held separately from AMA) took place in Milwaukee WI.

• Wisconsin Chapter- APTA becomes incorporated (April 12, 1951)

 Marquette University becomes the second academic institution to house a physical therapy program in the state. Beth Philips was the PT program director.

- PT Practice Act Created, licensing PTs
- PT examining committee within the Medical Examining Board was established and comprised of Chapter-member PTs
- First PT licensed in 1954

1962

Dorothy Briggs, PhD was appointed Associate Editor of JAPTA. She was also elected Vice Chairman of the Research Group of the APTA and instrumental in establishing Research as a section of APTA.

Maragret Kohli elected President of the Council of **Physical Therapy School Directors**

Jean Bailey was elected Speaker of the House.


• PES used for PT examination process by the State Board of Medical Examiners

• Jane Bolinske and Dick Duerr formed a self-employed section within the Wisconsin Chapter

- APTA charges state chapters with providing structure for PTA education at a two-year junior college level with state licensure as an outcome.
- At the time, PTs practiced under direct supervision of the physician. It was determined that PTs did not have the authority to set standards for licensing assistants.

Quality Assurance mandated by H-24, JCAH and Professional Standards Review Organization (PSRO). Required documented evidence that mechanism in place for monitoring and upgrading quality of care continually.

University of Wisconsin – La Crosse graduates its first BS class of physical therapists.



Direct Access legislation signed into law on 8/3/1989.

• Clinical Education Special Interest Group approved by Wisconsin Chapter. Gwyneth Straker, founder and First Chair.

Blackhawk Technical College receives accreditation

- Marquette physical therapy students initiated the Marquette Challenge as a fundraising effort to support physical therapy research.
- Since its inception, the Marquette Challenge has raised over \$4 million dollars for research.

Gateway Technical College PTA program becomes accredited.

- PT Practice Act Legislation:
 - Updated definition of physical therapy
 - PTs able to render a PT diagnosis
 - PTs able to perform spinal manipulation
 - License PTAs
 - Require continued competence of PTs/PTAs



Transition to DPT

- 2005:
 - Marquette University
 - Concordia University
 - UW Board of Regents approves consortial degree to be offered by UWL & UW-Milwaukee
- 2006:
 - Carroll University transitions to DPT
 - UW-Milwaukee hires its first program director, Kathy Zalewski, PT, PhD
- 2007:
 - UW-Madison obtains approval from Board of Regents to offer DPT




 New Rules established by the PTACB included ethics and jurisprudence training. Membership awareness of this important aspect of practice is in keeping with efforts to create an independent examining board and professional selfpolicing, consistent with Vision 2020.

2006 Direct Access

Amery Hospital, under leadership of Jeff
Nassman, becomes the first hospital in WI to
provide PT under direct access. UW Hospitals
would follow under leadership of Bill
Boissonnault. This is a great example of how
dynamic leadership can pave the way to progress
PT accessibility and practice liberties.

Chippewa Valley Technical College PTA program started.

2016 Diagnostic Imaging



Governor Walker signed AB549 into law allowing qualified PTs to order x-rays and radiologic technologists to accept such orders to take x-rays films as directed by a PT.

2010 PTEB



- Legislation passed to create the first independent Physical Therapy Examining Board (PTEB).
- Discussion surrounding this important change started in 1989!.



 Wisconsin communities.




Bryant Stratton PTA program opens in Milwaukee as a 5 semester accelerated program.
